

## A Year at Action Canada


In the first months of 2020, we moved into our new headquarters office in Ottawa, celebrated our 5th anniversary, published our five-year strategic plan, and a few months later, said goodbye to our first Executive Director Sandeep Prasad. This big change happened against the backdrop of massive global change—the coronavirus pandemic and the beginning of a growing movement for racial justice. Throughout, we continued to share stigma-free sexual health information, connect people with services, fight to defend abortion rights, advocate for sex-ed for all, and push for social change to realize sexual and reproductive health and rights for all.




## COVID-19 + SRHR

The coronavirus pandemic changed how we access, learn about, and advocate for abortion care, STI testing, contraception, and other sexual health services. It has shifted how people have sex, date, get health care and work, and raise their families. And we know it is having the deepest impact on the most marginalized communities.

We worked quickly in the spring to create a repository of information about the pandemic and abortion, pregnancy, birth, and sexual health. We built a network with associate organizations across the country and the National Abortion Federation to give a place for providers to share emerging information and to build a better rapid advocacy plan through the different phases of the pandemic. We advocated with governments of all levels to meet their human rights obligations by ensuring people can still access the essential sexual and reproductive healthcare they need during the pandemic.





Internationally, we called on Global Affairs Canada to adopt a feminist approach in its response to the pandemic and for Canada to stay the course on its commitment to SRHR. COVID-19 is having a critical impact on the provision of essential sexual and reproductive health services around the world, with health systems stretched to their limits, travel restrictions limiting access to services and commodities, and resources—including staff, supplies, and equipment—being diverted. Our goal is to make sure Canada continues to prioritize SRHR on the global stage.

## Election 2019—The personal is STILL political

Election 2019 was an important time to push back against anti-choice rhetoric and change the under-resourcing and stigmatization of SRHR in healthcare, by decision-makers, and in law and policy.



## **Abortion Rights and Access**

## **Abortion Caravan 50th Anniversary**

In May, we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the "Abortion Caravan" the convoy of activists, advocates, and brave women who travelled from Vancouver to Ottawa to protest the criminalization of abortion in 1970. We hosted a virtual conversation in collaboration with the Abortion Rights Coalition of Canada and the National Abortion Federation Canada featuring some of the original Abortion Caravan participants and author Karin Wells to mark the day and worked with academics and advocates to publish material reflecting on the changes in abortion rights from then to now.

## **Real Access for All**

Abortion was decriminalized in 1988—but that doesn't mean everyone in Canada has access. We published the new Access at a Glance: Abortion Services in Canada. This overview of abortion care in Canada shows where and what care is available, along with information safe access zones, crisis pregnancy centres, and health care ratios. Knowing the barriers people who can get pregnant face across the country strengthens our work to push for better laws, policies, and programs at the federal, provincial, and territorial level.




## "

Anti-choice and regressive populist movements everywhere are putting us all at risk and we must unite to fight. Abortion is one frontline in attacks against women, LGBTQ2 folks, migrants, youth, poor folks, people living with disabilities, people of colour. Restricting or denying abortion access has always disproportionately impacted the most marginalized. We will leave no one behind.





A number of candidates in the 2019 election campaigned on promises to restrict access to abortion both in Canada and globally through Canada's development assistance. To fight back, Action Canada launched *Commit to Resist*, a campaign to stand up for abortion rights. With support from 100 organizations and over 1,370 individuals across the country, our collective efforts proved instrumental in preventing a backslide on abortion access.

## Sex-Ed

Sex-ed saves lives. It's a fact: sex-ed done right is life changing and builds communities that are healthier and safer. It is also the human right of every young person in Canada. That is why we launched our #SexEdSavesLives campaign in collaboration with advocates, teachers, students, and other leaders to build a movement for comprehensive sex-ed for all.

## The State of Sex-Ed

Not all sex-ed is created equal. What are students learning and who is teaching them? What is sex-ed like in Nova Scotia versus Alberta?

To start a deeper national conversation about sexuality education, Action Canada published our *State of Sex-Ed* report. This one-of-a-kind publication analyzes the state of sex-ed across provinces and territories in Canada, featuring stories from young people speaking to their sex-ed experiences and a snapshot of the curricula in each province and territory.



## **Sexual and Reproductive Health Awareness Week**

Each year to mark SRH Week, we campaign to raise awareness around sexual and reproductive health and highlight resources designed to improve community health. In February 2020, we shared the message: Sex-ed Keeps Us Healthy. The week launched with a blog post by the Chief Public Health Officer of Canada, Dr. Theresa Tam.

Sex-ed is important to our health and tackles the root causes of negative health outcomes. Sex-ed shapes a culture of equality where everyone can thrive free from violence and discrimination and gives us the skills to nurture healthy relationships. We talked about sex-ed and health with a podcast, blog, webinar, social media toolkit, myth-busting graphics, and more content for everyone who cares about sex-ed.



## Advocacy on the Global Stage

## **Canadian Leadership on SRHR**

In the face of global crisis and rising anti-rights attacks, Canada's leadership on SRHR must be resilient. Through the *Future Planning Initiative*, Action Canada worked with elected and unelected officials to ensure Canada's support for SRHR is feminist and rights-based—including for the most neglected areas of SRHR, like safe abortion care, adolescent SRHR, family planning, and SRHR advocacy.



## **Rights from the Start**


With funding from Global Affairs Canada, Action Canada launched *Rights from the Start*, a four-year project in partnership with International Planned Parenthood Federation Western Hemisphere Region and national and regional partners in four countries in Latin America and the Caribbean. ## Access Line and the Emergency Fund

## **Access Line**

Action Canada's Access line is a confidential 24-hour countrywide toll-free number providing referrals and stigma-free information related to sexual and reproductive health to people across the country. Our staff and volunteers provide callers with referrals to abortion providers, information on where to get tested for STIs and contraception, or a judgment-free conversation to weigh their different pregnancy options. This year, we added more staff to the Line and continued to build our capacity to reach more callers. In the face of the pandemic, calls skyrocketed—with a record 573 calls in April—and cases became more complex.



We revamped our training program for volunteers to reflect the growing number of calls on STI testing, safer sex, and pandemic-related questions, deepened our partnership with the National Abortion Federation, brought on six new volunteers, and moved to a new online phone service.

Norma Scarborough Emergency Fund

Over 70% of Access Line callers who are looking to get an abortion face major barriers, like travel costs. These barriers are even greater for people who lack provincial health coverage, live in poverty, or have uncertain immigration status. The 100% donor-funded Emergency Fund lets us help get the care they need by covering transportation, medication, accommodation, and other related costs.



Action Canada gives a special thank you to Bev Chernos for her generous support that grew our capacity on the Access Line and made sure people in Canada had access to accurate sexual health information and referral during the pandemic.

## **Campaign: Get Tested Once a Year**

Action Canada's Get Tested Once a Year campaign, generously funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada, continued with a new campaign growing awareness of STI testing for racialized young people in the Greater Toronto Area. Our ads about where, how, and why to get tested were seen over 14 million times, reaching 242,559 people on Instagram and Facebook, 474,342 on YouTube, and 586,596 on Snapchat. Young people who saw the campaign were more likely to hold a positive attitude toward STI testing, with newcomer youth even more likely.

### **Sexual Rights Initiative**

The Sexual Rights Initiative (SRI) is a coalition of national and regional organizations based in Canada, Poland, India, Egypt, Argentina, and South Africa that work together to advance human rights related to sexuality at the United Nations. Action Canada holds the Secretariat, working with Akahatá, the Coalition of African Lesbians, CREA, the Egyptian Initiative for Personal Rights, and the Federation for Women and Family Planning (Poland). The SRI team, based out of Geneva:

- Published Rituals and Resistance: Sexual Rights in the Second Cycle of the UPR, the newest report on SRHR and the UPR process
- Participated in the 42nd, 43rd, and 44th Human Rights Council sessions and the 34th and 35th sessions of the Universal Periodic Review
- Updated and managed two sexual rights and policy databases to assist advocates, policymakers, UN agencies, and diplomats in their sexual and reproductive health and rights advocacy at national and international levels
- Continued advocacy for the rights to bodily autonomy and comprehensive sexuality education at the international level
- Mobilized civil society support for safe abortion everywhere and gave the Joint Civil Society Statement on International Safe Abortion Day in Geneva on behalf of 353 organizations and 534 individuals

This past year, the SRI also supported Action Canada in preparing for Canada's review before the UN Committee on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women and UN Committee on Economic Social and Cultural Rights. Both reports highlight areas where the Government of Canada is failing to meet its obligations to meet the human rights of people in Canada to comprehensive sexual and reproductive health across provinces and territories.


